## TRF Talk

### Last Meeting

The last meeting was held on Tuesday 11th of November at The Swans Nest near Exminster.

The meeting was very well attended with 30 attendees. The main points discussed were:

- Agreeing a voting process for group officers for next month's AGM (see below).
- Newsletter Editor Michael Ollier discussed the possible need for more expenditure regarding the distribution of the newsletter if it is to continue being sent across the country to all TRF members who have Devon group as a secondary group. No firm consensus was reached, but Michael would contact national to gain more info.

- Forum Administrator Doug Piper discussed the issues with allowing forum users access to private areas. The consensus was that in lieu of a permanent solution (which is unlikely to come from the forum's creators), various sections of the forum that are currently private should be made available to all forum users, namely Ride-outs and Lane Clearing.

- Events organiser John Heal stated the dates and prices for our annual Teign-to-Tamar event next year. See the events section further down the newsletter for more information.

- Lane Clearing Coordinator Ian Collins discussed a number of lanes on his radar. Devon County Council have agreed to supply Devon TRF Group with the appropriate amount of stone to fill a very deep ditch along Lower Lye Lane near Stockland if we provide the labour. There were also discussions around Back Lane near Colaton Raleigh, and Ham Lane near Dalwood. See the Lane Closures and Repairs section of the newsletter for more information.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> of December at **The Swans Nest, Exminster**, with the room available from around 1830 hours. The meeting itself will start at 2000 hours.

**Please note: for those coming from the A38/A380, the A379 will likely be shut somewhere between Wobbly Wheel (Orange Elephant) and The Devon Hotel roundabout after 1900hrs. Easiest diversion would be to use M5 J30 and proceed via Countess Weir.**

## **Lane Closures and Repairs**

Those of you who frequent the forum may have seen our Lane Clearing Coordinator, Ian Collins (aka Wacky) is compiling a list of known lanes that require substantial work.

Hopefully from November onwards, the Lane Clearing section of the forum should be open to all forum members.

Ian was present at our last meeting and discussed a few lanes on his radar as follows:

**Lower Lye Lane, Stockland 192-024/5174:** This lane has had a bit of attention recently. It was first brought to our attention in June by Jack Delve (of Devon Lane Database fame) who reported on our forum that two walls had been built at the north-western part of the lane, narrowing the entrance. He subsequently reported it to DCC who stated they were in contact with the landowner. Fast forward to the end of July when Devon TRF members attended a clearing session at the lane. Whilst there it became apparent that a very deep channel had been eroded into one side of the lane (over 2m deep in places), and that a contributing factor to this may have been a series of drainage channels that appeared to have been constructed along with the aforementioned walls, allowing surface water from houses around the head of the lane to be channelled directly into it, reminiscent of a sort of concrete and flint Quay West. It now appears that to wash their hands of it, Devon County Council are willing to provide the necessary aggregate to fill the water channel if Devon TRF are willing to provide the labour to fill it, with the agreement that the newly built drainage channels and narrow walled entry to the lane remain. This was discussed with Ian by the PRow officer for that area during his work with a different organisation.

The next steps for our group would be not only to organise a date for the work and delivery of materials, but also to figure out how. The lane is narrow, especially at the point with the drainage channel, and with such a large drop there are obvious health and safety concerns with using plant machinery, which ultimately lead to insurance complications. However, the channel is approximately 150m long and reaches a depth of around 2m in places; the quantity and size/grade of aggregate needed would require a lot of manpower if machinery were not to be used.

**Does this sound like a problem you'd like to engineer a solution to?** Any help with this job would go a long way to maintaining our relationship with DCC.



**Back Lane, Colaton Raleigh, 192-153/5294:** This lane has been subject to numerous TTROs to all users since spring 2024 when a small landslide narrowed the usable lane and accentuated the drop down into the gully that runs alongside. It appears the locals don't care much for the TTROs and the fences that are put up are usually moved aside soon after. Furthermore, no apparent work has been carried out except for the installation of two bollards, one at each end of the damaged section, clearly designed to obstruct heavier vehicles and reduce further damage to the bank. We did write a small piece on this lane in August's newsletter pondering whether the bollards indicated an unofficial TRO for cars only. The lane appears to be popular with locals, and the local Rights of Way Warden wishes to reopen it, but there is no approved repair so far. Our group are trying to negotiate a suitable repair that we can assist DCC with. This will likely require extensive volunteering when given the go-ahead.

**Dotton Lane, Newton Poppleford, 192-146/5289:** This is a case of two overlying rights of way succumbing to the same fate. There was a pedestrian bridge over the river Otter, and in the shadow of the bridge upstream a fording route for vehicles. Deterioration of the eastern riverbank has in essence destroyed the bridge, but also made getting into and out of the river unfeasible on the eastern side. DCC and the Environment Agency are drawing up plans to replace the bridge to bridleway standards, possibly at a different location. This may ultimately lead to the loss of the original route and thus the vehicular rights that exist across the river at the original point. There is not much that can currently be done in the physical line here, but any news about a new bridge would be greatly appreciated. **Ham Lane, Dalwood, 192-053/5202:** A lane of Devon TRF fame, with a good description of works carried out on our website. Ultimately, water flow along the stream has undermined the digger tracks used to hold aggregate against the bank and has washed them out. Ian has come into some wire mesh which he hopes to envelope the rock sections with to reduce the amount of aggregate washed away. This has been trialled on some of the sections of this lane to great effect. Again, this would require some volunteers to enact, so keep an ear out. **Lower Ladram Lane, Otterton, 192-184/5322:** A house near this lane exploded back in the summer due to a gas leak. There have been reports of debris on the lane and closure signs, and we are unsure of its status. Can anyone report back? Picture below courtesy of Ian Collins.





**Higher Rill Farm Lane, East Hill, 192-092/5420:** A tree has ‘fallen’ and blocked the southwest entrance to this lane. To enter the lane requires the ability to lift the front wheel of your motorbike, whereas it is easier to exit the lane due to the build up of debris behind the ‘fallen’ tree. We hope to clear this soon. Any volunteers would be appreciated. Image below courtesy of Ian Collins.

## **Identifying Future Lanes**

Run recorder John Leah has asked for those submitting run-reports to also include any roads that aren't logged on the GRM, but are starting to break up, have 'Road Closed, or 'Not Suitable for Vehicles' signs.

This request applies to all, but more specifically those who send their run-reports in as a GPX file. John's software cross references the GPX file with known lanes, but he needs

additional written information to note these lanes down.

If DCC neglect to maintain these roads, they may well become the trails of the future, so it is beneficial for us to log them.

## Local News

Hopefully most Devon TRF members will have received a couple of emails over the last few months regarding a Devon TRF organised trip away. The event, being organised by Julian Harman, is aimed at bringing members from across the county together in another part of the country to ride and socialise together.

The event is now going ahead, and will take place from Thursday 4th to Monday 8th of June 2026.
